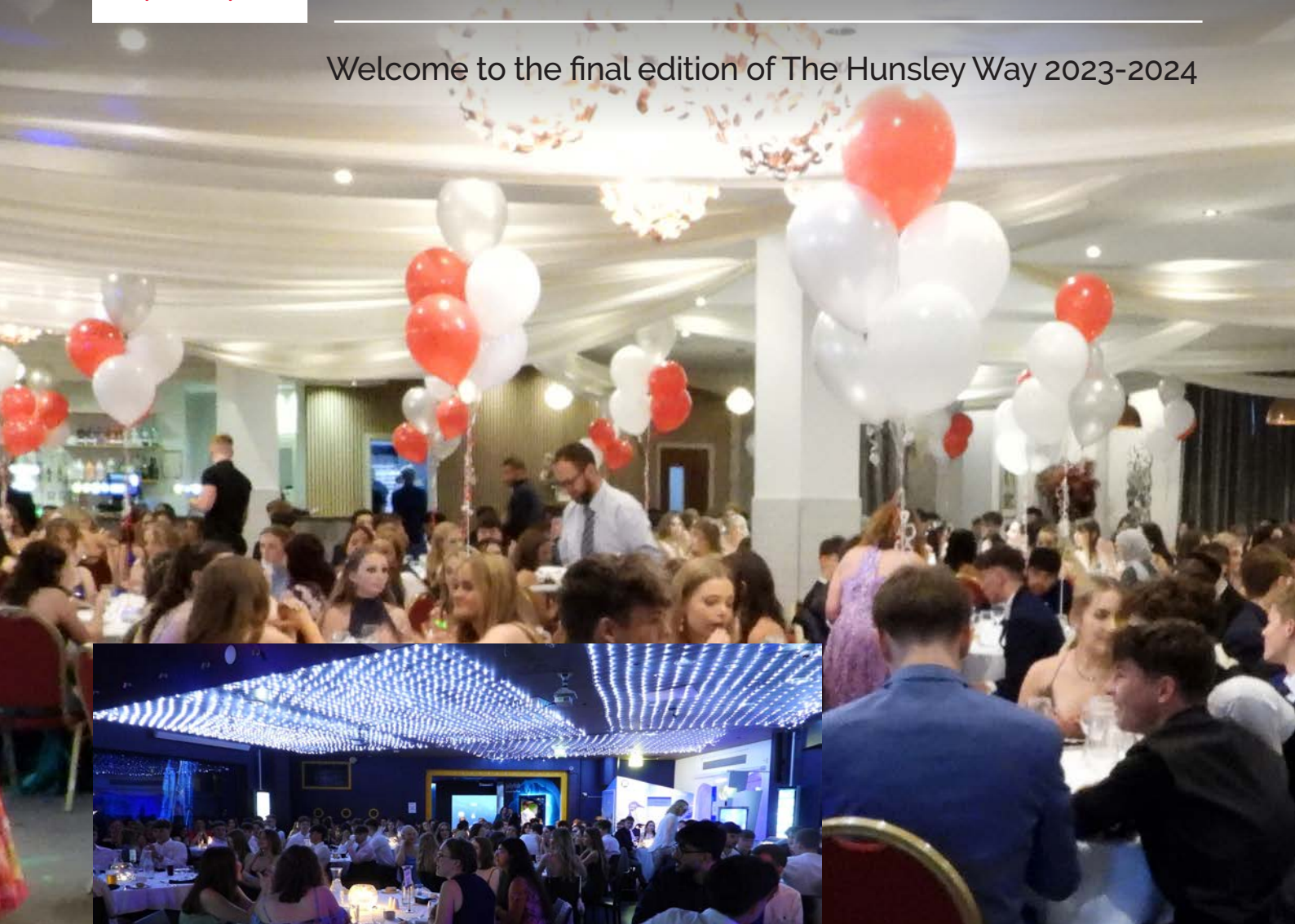

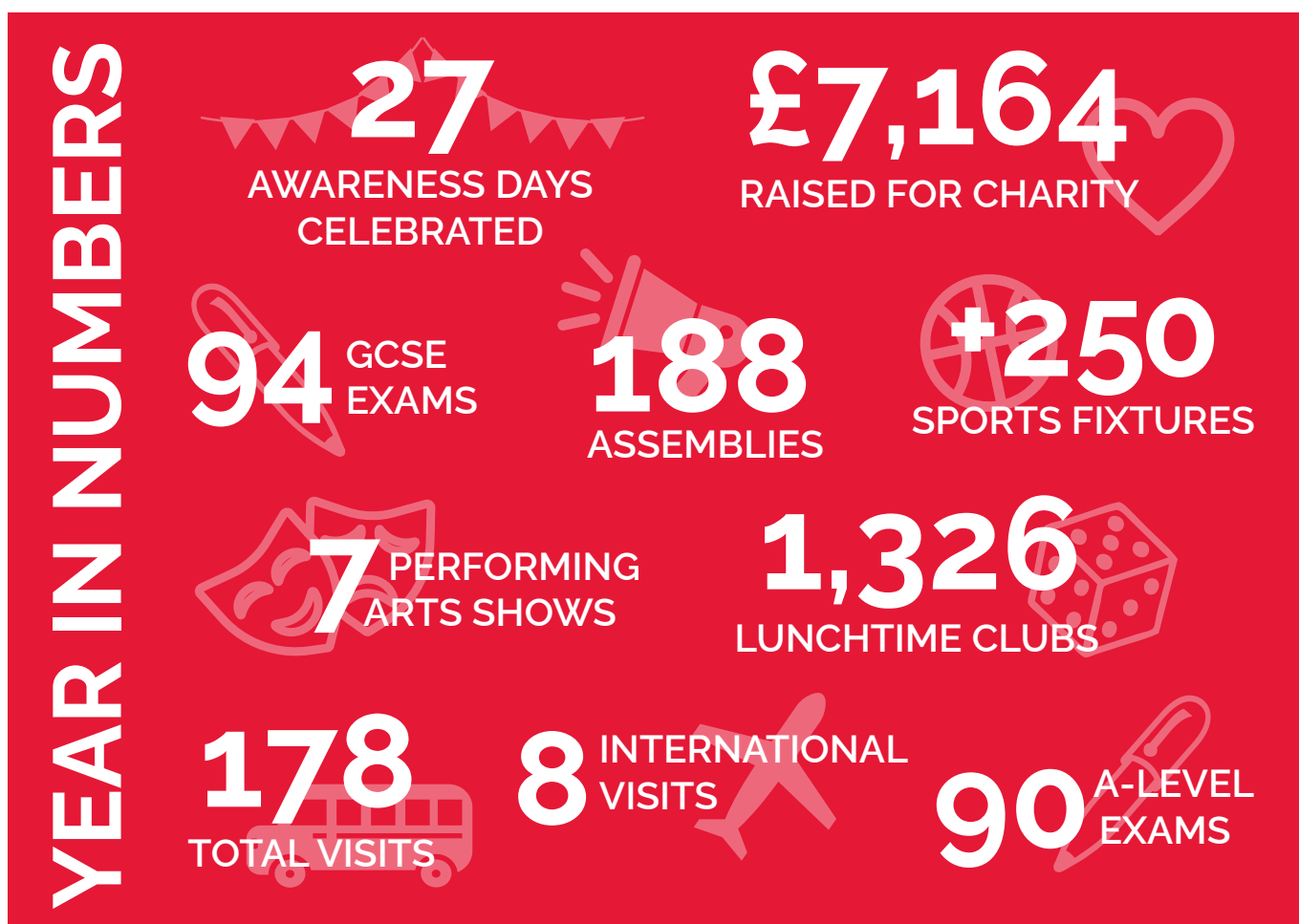
I could go on, but you will be able to read about the many things our brilliant pupils have been involved in throughout the pages.

GREEN FLAG AWARD



We have had a very busy half term completing our application for the Green Flag Award. We would like to thank everyone that has helped with this, we were happy to learn that we achieved a **Distinction**. Our final project was to build an insect hotel at the back of Kingston. For this we stacked up pallets and filled them with bamboo, broken tiles, fir cones, branches and leaves. We hope that this will end up being a brilliant habitat for all the different insects we have around our school, and will provide a space for the pollinators needed for our flowers. It also helps to improve the biodiversity in the area and support the ecosystem. Insect hotels are very easy to make and can easily be made by placing twigs and fir cones into a plant pot, then placing it in the garden.



NET ZERO

Thursday 4 July

This term saw Year 9 pupils engage in a Navigating Net Zero session hosted by Engaging Education, whereby the groups had the opportunity to listen to and communicate directly with key employers in the sector before completing a series of team challenges. The aim of the sessions are to make the Net Zero industry more accessible to the wider community, starting with young people who will be leading the workplace of tomorrow.

HULL COLLEGE TALKS

SCIENCE COMPETITION WINNERS

Tuesday 18 June

Back in April, the Year 10 Separate Science pupils took part in the National Scientific Thinking Challenge run by Warwick University. The challenge is designed to get pupils to develop their scientific thinking skills in a STEM context, with questions ranging from hot air balloons to ocean cleanups, to malaria. We recently received the results, and 7 pupils received the gold certificate meaning that they had placed in the top 10% nationally, which was a great achievement. Well done!



CRANSWICK VISIT

Monday 24 June

This term saw our Year 10 Food and Nutrition pupils visit popular Yorkshire baker Cranswick Foods in Malton to learn more about the range of careers in the food industry. The group discussed roles within departments such as new product development, food science and marketing, before taking a factory tour and developing their own pastries in the test kitchen.

CURRICULUM SPOTLIGHT: ENGLISH

"A reader lives a thousand lives before he dies. The man who never reads lives only one." - George R.R. Martin.

The study of English is more than simply learning to read and write, it empowers us to communicate effectively and creatively, to think critically, but - perhaps most importantly - it also allows us to walk in the shoes of others, experiencing life's triumphs, trials and tribulations through the eyes of another so that we might better understand how to face such events when we too are faced with them. This term our Year 7 – Year 10 pupils have been exploring the human experience through the literary medium of poetry.

Poetry can be a word that strikes instant fear into the hearts of schoolchildren – and adults alike! However, our pupils have taken on the challenge of not just reading and analysing a poet's work, but also of crafting and creating their own with enthusiasm, and it has been a delight to see. In Year 7, our classes have read and deciphered a range of poetry around the theme of relationships where we have been impressed by the way in which pupils have managed to decode the meaning of the challenging poetry

they have read by working together to question the poet's choices and analyse the poet's purpose before crafting their own poetry around the same themes and applying the same poetic techniques such as motifs, anaphora and enjambment - displayed in Evelyn C's [analysis](#) and Cian P's recreative poem of *'Remember'*.

With thanks to Miss Wallace and Miss Thompson, our pupils have also nurtured their love for creative writing, poetry and the arts in their lunchtime clubs.



With Miss Wallace, the **Creative Writing Club** have met on a weekly basis to share ideas and develop their creative writing skills in both prose and poetry. Their works have been submitted to various national and local competitions. [Maya B](#) in Year 10 won the TEAL Poet Laureate KS4 Competition!

With Miss Thompson, the Poetry by Heart club memorised and performed a choice of two poems which were filmed and sent to a panel of judges along with 110,000 children and young people.

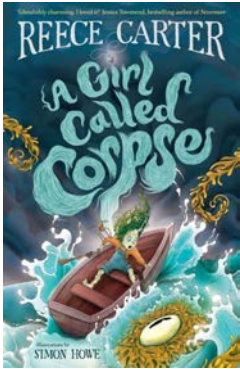
Dexter W made it to the grand finale of the national Poetry by Heart competition at the Globe Theatre where he had the privilege of standing on a historic stage to perform his two chosen poems, *'Invitation to Love'* by Dunbar and *'Trees'* by Larkin, to an audience that included renowned poets such as Daljit Nagra, Imtiaz Dharker, Simon Armitage (Poet Laureate), Joseph Coelho (UK Children's Laureate) whilst his teammates cheered him on and applauded his courage. At the conclusion of the finale the poet, Daljit Nagra, stated: *'We poets write poems to help us understand our incredible universe... We dream dreams into words. Then we poets publish our poems. But what does the poem want once it's published? It wants to be read. It wants to be said aloud and above all, each poem is in love with being remembered'*.

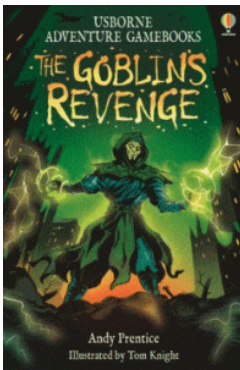
The books below are all longer-length texts, which will give pupils the opportunity to lose themselves in a story and challenge their literary abilities.

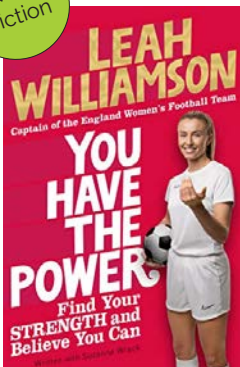


Secrets of the Snakestone
