

MESSAGE FROM HEADTEACHER





Welcome to the first newsletter of the academic year!

Staff returned to school in September delighted that our GCSF and

Post 16 students achieved another superb set of examination results in the summer and have been able to transition successfully to their chosen destinations. Their remarkable achievements are testimony to their diligence, resilience and determination to succeed: as well as the expertise and hard work of staff and the support provided from parents/ carers. The results days were a wonderful opportunity to celebrate as a community.

I also wish to express my gratitude to the parents/ carers and students, who were affected by the inaccurate results in GCSE Art and Photography. I appreciate this was a difficult time and I want to thank you for your patience and understanding whilst we pursued the matter. All candidates have now been notified that our appeal to the examination board was successful, and following an external review of the moderation process, all of the school's original grades have been rightly reinstated.

With more than 400 students in the Sixth Form now, it definitely has a buzz about it! Year 12 have made an overwhelmingly positive start and in my first student voice session with them, it was clear to see how much they are enjoying Sixth Form life. We really are fortunate to work with such terrific young

adults who are role models for our younger students.

Similarly, Year 7 students have settled in very quickly and are also making a very positive impression. I am enjoying seeing them in lessons and chatting to them at social times as they share their achievements with me and the rest of the team. A number of Year 7 students also spoke to parents/carers at our recent Open Evening. They were superb and terrific ambassadors for the school. Their enthusiasm is infectious and I look forward to them experiencing more that South Hunsley has to offer next half term.

Having been in post a year now, it has been much easier to identify early the areas that we will focus on this year. A key priority, that

remains a national priority, is attendance. I want to offer my sincere thanks to parents/carers for working in partnership with us as we are making significant progress and are almost back to precovid levels of attendance in school.

Another priority that has continued from last year is SEND. We have made some significant developments but have further plans which include working in partnership with Northcott School, continuing with the parent/carer working group and prioritising training for staff on ADHD and neurodiversity.

Creating a culture of reading and supporting weaker readers is a priority this year and we are excited to have been successful in our request to be part of a national pilot to trial a commercial phonics intervention programme aimed at secondary school students. We will keep relevant parties updated on this as well as prioritising reading across the curriculum and making it a regular feature in this newsletter.

Continuing to develop best practice in specific aspects of teaching will remain on our school improvement plan year on year. Dylan William, a Professor in Education, said: 'Teaching is such a complex craft that a lifetime is not

enough to master it.' Teachers across The Education Alliance are committed to professional development because we acknowledge that even the strongest teachers can continue to refine their pedagogy. Last year, we focused on retrieval and this year checking for understanding in lessons will be our thread. Similarly, we regularly review our curriculum offer, ensuring it leads to successful outcomes and enables students to reach their chosen destinations.

Strengthening communication between home and school is another area we are keen to explore this year and we will be in touch in the new year to gather your feedback and ideas

The final area we are continuing to focus on is personal excellence. Our plans include work on character and behaviour. You will have seen that we have made some changes to the planner this year and warnings for conduct and organisation have been separated. This means that students will not receive the most serious sanctions as a result of a lack of organisation. (Please note that unless students are receiving 4 written warnings for conduct or 4 for organisation, the warnings are just reminders about our expectations. They are

not recorded and each week is a fresh start for students) In contrast, we place more emphasis on positive recognition through the stamps awarded in planners. Students should be receiving up to three stamps every lesson and they can collect additional ones from staff around the school site. Stamps can be awarded for a number of reasons including correct equipment, engaging in lessons, being on time and producing great work. These are recorded and can be saved throughout the year and exchanged for larger rewards in our shop or more frequently for smaller items. To continue to support school with behaviour, a key thing parents/carers can do is check planners and praise/reward students for the number of stamps they are receiving. Thank you to all the parent/carers who we know regularly do this.

Lastly, thank you to all the parents/carers who have informed us about your child's achievements outside of school. We love to hear about them as it provides us with another opportunity to praise students and build positive relationships.

Thank you for your continued support and I wish you all an enjoyable half term.

ECO UPDATE

We have had a great start to the year welcoming lots of new faces to the eco-committee, and we are looking forward to starting our projects for this year.

We have already completed our first litter pick of the year, and had an overwhelming number of volunteers, so we are very grateful to all of those. We spent an hour after school collecting litter from various areas. Unfortunately, we collected quite a lot of litter from around the seating areas and the field. However, we have just had our first EcoHunsley assembly of the year, which we spoke about the litter we had found, so we are hoping this encourages everyone to place their rubbish into the bins around school.

Did you know, that from the 380 million portions of fish and chips sold each year, 75% of those contain litter that the fish have eaten. This isn't just microplastics, but large chunks that you would be able to actually feel if you chewed it. This is just one of the many important reasons it is important to put litter into the bins. It is very important in our community as we are so close to the Humber, meaning that any litter thrown around can easily make its way into the river and then into the sea.

One of our projects this year for the Green Flag Award is giving each form group a plant to look after. They will have to water it, and make sure it has all the correct conditions. At the end of the year there will be prizes for the healthiest plant. We had a lot of fun planting the plants into their own pots to be delivered to the form, so we hope that the classes take really good care of them.

APPRENTICESHIP PREPARATION PROGRAMME

Launched September 2024!

Our Apprenticeship Preparation Programme aims to support those students in Year 11 and Year 13 with their applications into higher and degree level apprenticeships.

The programme was set up in response to national feedback regarding no structured timeline for apprenticeships compared to the UCAS process. At South Hunsley we decided to set up a programme of our own, gaining national recognition and winning a number of awards.



STUDENT WORKSHOPS

Those on the Apprenticeship Preparation Programme are able to take part in a number of different activities and workshops to support a future application.

So far, students have benefited from a number of different workshops such as Search and Apply, CV Writing and Degree Apprenticeships. There have also been a number of employer talks to discuss the various recruitment and selection processes within the region. Businesses such as Cranswick PLC, Wilkinchapman Solicitors, HBTC, JZ Flowers Hull City, Microsoft and Yorkshire Wolds Teacher Training have delivered sessions.

More talks are scheduled next term from RSM Accountants, BAE Systems, Heron Foods, Inspire Ignite and Health Captains which aim to support those looking for experience in the health and social care sector. There will also be an on-line webinar from a nationally recognised employability skills development organisation. Students who are looking for an apprenticeship or going to university are able to sign-up to these opportunities via TEAMS or email to Mrs Barley.

SAM FOSTER - TALENT AQUISITION AT CRANSWICK PLC

"We engaged with The Apprenticeship Preparation Programme last February which is led by Sarah Barley, who does an excellent job of showcasing all career options available to students—something we don't often see with other schools and sixth form colleges.

We were asked to come in to deliver a talk on the career options at Cranswick PLC and discuss the application process. Following this two students were able to secure a degree apprenticeship with us.

Lilly was particularly passionate about food, initially planning to study Food Science at university. However, after learning about our Food Science Degree Apprenticeship through the partnership, she applied and impressed us during the two-stage interview process in early 2024. She was offered a position starting in the summer, pending her A-level results.

Jacob was set on pursuing an apprenticeship but was unsure about which path to take. Through our partnership with South Hunsley, he was introduced to our Operations Degree Apprenticeship. Following his successful two-stage interview in early 2024, Jacob was also offered a start later that summer, pending his A-level results. He has since enrolled in the four-year Manufacturing Management Degree Apprenticeship with the University of Lincoln.

Both students are now earning a competitive salary while working full-time in the industry, studying part-time at university, and earning a degree qualification—all with academic and professional costs fully covered by us.

We are very much looking forward to working with South Hunsley's unique and innovative Apprenticeship Preparation Programme again this year."

CURRICULUM SPOTLIGHT: GEOGRAPHY

Within Geography we seek to further understand the physical world around us and learn about our place within it. We look at the relationships between ourselves and the natural environment as well as the changing nature of our world.

At South Hunsley one of our aims is for students to appreciate the wonder and awe of our planet and have opportunities to learn more. In Year 7 we start by looking at our local area through Ordnance Survey Maps; students love spotting features they know as well as learning the skills to interpret them.

For us being able to leave the classroom is key; we run trips at different scales so students can achieve this. Starting in Year 7 we measure microclimates around the school and consider how features like aspect can create differing conditions, GCSE students are able to see how York fits into the Burgess Model and consider urban changes. They also visit Hornsea and Flamborough Head to see the effects of erosion and longshore drift and consider how humans have interrupted these processes.




Within A Level Geography we visit a range of urban localities (Hull. Leeds. Middlesbrough) to see how planners have attempted to make successful urban environments and consider their effectiveness. Students also have the opportunity to visit the land of fire and ice. Iceland. and really marvel at what nature can achieve. As well as considering how humans can harness this power to help us achieve our goals.

All these opportunities we hope, help students to appreciate the wonder of our world and to help them learn more about how our actions affect and change it.

INSPIRING READING



WELCOME TO OUR FIRST INSPIRING READING PAGE

At South Hunsley, we recognise the importance of reading in improving life chances for young people. We share our love of reading through promoting a culture of reading, providing students with access to a range of texts in all subjects and supporting students who struggle with reading with interventions and in class support. We aim to develop independent readers who have a good understanding of texts - both fiction and non-fiction.

The purpose of this page is to provide practical support for parents to support students with reading outside of school.

Where can we access quality texts?

- School or community libraries not only offer free access to books, but they often also have audio books and e-books that your child could borrow.
- Book shops provide a chance for your child to browse and purchase books with support from the staff, if they wish. Some book shops will have review cards dotted around with some of their top-picks too.
- Audio books can be purchased from devices, including phones, as well as on CDs or borrowed from a library.

How do we choose what to read?

- Helping them to enjoy reading and find material they want to read is the important thing. This might mean they choose a fiction novel, but it might mean that they also find a range of online articles or websites they enjoy exploring. They may find they enjoy reading magazines or graphic novels.
- Think about topics they are interested in. You could look at fiction books related to the topic, or encourage them to read online articles about it.
- If they have liked a book before, encourage them to read another text by the same author.

How can I support my child with reading?

- Help your child to be proactive in their wider reading. For example, if they are covering WWII, explore age appropriate texts on this through poetry, online articles or novels. You can find out what your child is studying by accessing the curriculum section on our website.
- Find a quiet space and time during the day/week where your child can regularly read alone or with you.
- Take an interest in what they're reading and studying at school by reading around topics as well so that you can engage in discussion about their texts/ areas of learning, whilst modelling an interest in reading.
