MESSAGE FROM HEADTEACHER



Welcome to the Spring edition of our newsletter! Although it has been a short half term, you can see from the contents that it has been a busy and rewarding five weeks.

Firstly, I would like to publicly congratulate the PE department and other colleagues who support the team in offering the vast array of sports fixtures and visits to our pupils.

To be named the 3rd best state school in the country for sport is a remarkable achievement and one the whole school and wider community can be proud of.

Alongside the numerous events, I have spent time this half term getting to know the community more. I have enjoyed visiting local primary schools and would like to thank them all for making me so welcome. It has been a pleasure meeting staff and saying hello to the children across the full age range and I look forward to visiting the remaining schools in the weeks ahead.

I have also been fortunate enough to visit, with Mrs Pipes (Head of Drama), the Northern Academy of Performing Arts (NAPA) in Hull which some of our pupils attend outside of school. We enjoyed a tour of the wonderful historic building and discussed with the Chief Executive and Chair of Trustees opportunities to work with NAPA to promote the arts.

In addition to the visits mentioned. I have continued to hold pupil voice meetings throughout the half term.

These are always a highlight of my week as I look forward to meeting pupils in small groups and listening to their views which are insightful, mature, and honest. Pupils have told us that they feel listened to and appreciate the changes we have made

in response to their feedback. For example, I am pleased to report that Cube² has made a significant difference to queue times and following feedback from pupils, we have increased the number of seats available in The Space at lunchtime.

Similarly, I have also held a headteacher's surgery this half term which was well attended and a valuable opportunity for me to meet parents/carers, listen to specific feedback and address any individual concerns.

Thank you to all parents/ carers who attended. I have shared your positive feedback and followed up on any concerns raised.

Following progress evenings, we have also shared parental surveys and I would like to thank parents/

carers for taking the time to complete them. Whilst we were very pleased with the responses we are not complacent and will continue with our planned school improvements.

A key strand in our current school improvement plan is our provision for pupils with SEND.

This half term we have reviewed the SEND Policy and are currently working with colleagues, across our trust schools, on a new one-page profile to further support staff to know and understand how to best support pupils with specific needs. In addition, morning briefings and other training opportunities have had an increased SEND focus this year. We have also reached

out to a number of parents/ carers to establish a SEND parent group to provide valuable input and feedback on our current provision and future plans which include a new SEND area for pupils. If you are interested in joining this group, please don't hesitate to let me know via the main school reception.

I am sure you will have seen in the media how difficult it currently is to recruit teachers, and this is particularly the case in subjects such as Maths and Science. As a result, we have advertised early this year for a number of positions, and I am delighted to share that we have appointed four excellent Science teachers and have a strong field for a vacancy in English. In addition, we have appointed

in Art and PE, again both from excellent fields and Maths is our next priority.

We are very proud of the breadth of our co-curricular offer in school and I would like to thank staff who have gone above and beyond for our pupils this half term by once again running numerous visits, events, clubs and fixtures.

I don't think many schools will have three overseas visits taking place this half term so thank you in advance to colleagues for sacrificing time with their own families. We hope the visits are a great success and everyone has a fantastic time.

Enjoy the half term break. School reopens to all pupils on Monday 19th February.



Got old devices still hanging around?

You're not the only one. It's estimated by Giffgaff there are 55 million unused mobile phones in the UK alone. These devices cannot and should not be thrown in the bin. Luckily, it's not too difficult to dispose of them responsibly without contributing to the fastest growing domestic waste stream: E-waste. Sending old devices to landfill or to be incinerated means they will release harmful toxins such as mercury, lead and cadmium into soil, water and the atmosphere that can cause harm to the environment, animal and even human health.

- Trade devices in to retailers such as an Apple Store - you could make some extra money!
- Donate old, functioning devices to charity shops for someone in need.

Will any data on my old devices be vulnerable?

For many phones, doing a factory reset should be sufficient to securely remove data before handing it in to be recycled or given to charity.

Do you actually need that new device?

More and more devices are being released and the life cycle of products is shrinking. Yes, your device may be running slower, and yes it may be easier to buy a newer model, but is it really needed?

Instead of buying the newest phone, why not try:

- Passing old, still functioning devices onto family members
- Sticking with a device until it stops working
- Repair what you can
- Buy from sustainable brands and buy durable products.

Other ways to reduce the environmental impact of technology:

- Print better if a printer alerts you that something is running low, check that it is completely empty before replacing
- Go digital where you can instead
- Have automatic sensors for lights
- Have systems in place to ensure devices turn off after not being used.

All in all, just recycle

NATIONAL APPRENTICESHIP WEEK



Monday 5 - Sunday 11 February

National Apprenticeship Week (NAW) took place between 5 to 11 February 2024 and was an opportunity for our school and the Careers department to celebrate the achievements of apprentices around the country and the positive impact they make to communities, businesses, and the wider economy. As part of the focus week, pupils were able to take part in an assembly run by HETA an apprenticeship and training provider with a speciality in engineering. Our social media account was also a hub for useful resources for parents/carers to find out more when helping their child to make decisions about their futures. We shared links to podcasts as well as reallife testimonials from people who have carried out apprenticeships.

Apprenticeships Explained

Apprenticeships combine practical training in a job with study.

As an apprentice you'll:

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- Be an employee earning a wage and getting holiday pay
- Work alongside experienced staff
- Gain job-specific skills
- Get time for training and study related to your role (at least 20% of your normal working hours).

Apprenticeships take 1-5 years to complete depending on their level. Some apprenticeships may also give you an additional qualification, such as a diploma.






TOPIC OF THE WEEK
