


Welcome to the Religious Studies Curriculum

'Being Unique and celebrating a world of Difference'

Religious Studies enables learners to reflect upon and deepen their understanding of human culture, beliefs and thought. It is a quest for understanding the self and the nature of what it means to be human. It is important to understand the role religion plays in everyday life, whether we believe in a higher power or not, religion influences many aspects of our daily life. It is an opportunity for developing our understanding of the morality of others whilst realizing our own.

The Religious Studies curriculum has been designed to build upon prior knowledge of religions covered at KS2 and extend a learners religious literacy in more depth. The curriculum allows students to make numerous links between different religions, cultures and traditions, ensuring a knowledge of similarities as well as differences between the main religious traditions. Preparing students to be thoughtful, respectful and understanding of the differences of others in their local and global community.



Religious Studies at south Hunsley:

In Religious Studies we consider individual religions as followed and practiced worldwide, as well as through a thematic approach, considering common areas and areas of divergence. Our students learn how faith is practiced and shared, gaining understanding and knowledge of local, national and global community issues. This is combined with a greater awareness of self and all of our inner potential. As students progress they build upon knowledge obtained in earlier years, and gain new insights in to the world around them, further developing skills of analysis and evaluation. Our curriculum is designed to support students with their long term memory and ensure they develop a confident level of religious literacy through careful sequencing of topics and content.

The delivery of Religious Studies curriculum is designed around the locally agreed syllabus, the local and national nature of religions and topics to develop a student's understanding of the world around them. They will leave with a wider spiritual knowledge and an ongoing curiosity in the concepts of religious and non-religious traditions.
