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#### MESSAGE FROM HEADTEACHER



Hello! It was great to hear (in the survey referenced below) how many parents/carers read The Hunsley Way. Although this half term has been shorter in length, we seem to have had just as much going on which hopefully is evident in this edition of the newsletter.



Firstly, can I thank the 495 parents/carers who responded to the recent survey on communication. You feedback is greatly appreciated and extremely useful as we are keen to listen and respond. We have included in the charts below a brief summary of the results that are easy to share in this format. However, rest assured that I have read every comment and shared them with the rest of the leadership team who are working with me on a more detailed 'you said/we will' response which will be completed after the half term break. We have also shared with specific named colleagues the positive feedback you kindly provided.

Before moving on, I want to reassure parents/carers that whilst we are exploring a new social media platform, we have listened to your feedback about this not being an alternative form of essential communication. We appreciate a number of parents/carers do not use social media and do not want

to miss out on any essential information.

The SEND parents/carers Working Party met again this term and we were delighted to welcome 30+ parents across two sessions. The main agenda item explored this time was 'homework' and we also shared details of the training staff received on ADHD and Autism in the January training day. The feedback received is informing our practice and it is very encouraging to hear that those in attendance are feeling listened to. We will be in in touch regarding the next meeting and new members are very welcome.

Keeping with the theme of feedback and engaging with parents/carers, a number of you will have received a short survey following progress evenings. Whilst we have had a good response to these, we would welcome even more. We do use the feedback to inform some of our decisions in school and we are therefore mindful that we want to ensure any survey results represent the views of

the wider school community. Many thanks to those who have engaged.

Lastly on feedback, the next headteacher's surgery will take place on Wednesday 26 March and specific details will be sent closer to the event.

Moving on, a highlight this term was seeing Year 11 students collect their mock examination results. Their attitude throughout the exam period was exemplary and we were all delighted to see so many happy faces. With even more time to build on this success and in some cases, address some identified gaps in knowledge, we are confident that this year group are on course to achieve some superb results. I would like to pass on my congratulations to all Year 11 students and commend them on their hard work and excellent attitude. Thank you also to the staff who are committed to supporting our students to thrive and to parents and carers who continue to work in partnership with us. Following the half term break, we will

be hosting a 'Set for Success' evening where we will share with parents/carers some suggestions to support Year 11 children through the exam period. 

#### **BIRD CAMERA**

We are very excited that a blue tit has appeared in our bird box. We are not sure if this is the same one as last year, but it will be very special if it is the same bird coming for a second year to have her babies. They will be starting to collect for their nest which they will begin to build soon. As with last year there will be a live stream so we can see everything that is happening with the birds.

Nesting birds need as much help as they can get as it is a very difficult environment for them especially as we go from winter into spring, here are some tips:

- Don't tidy away fallen leaves, the birds love leaves and twigs to build their nests.
- Make sure your pets aren't disturbing the hedgerows, this will scare off the birds.
- Try to supply clean water and refill bird feeders, as in winter food and water is very scarce, but make sure you are cleaning these out regularly.

# ALLOTMENT PROJECT

As we are getting closer to spring, we will be able to start again with our allotment. Last year the allotment group managed to grow vegetables that were used by some students in their cooking lessons. As EcoHunsley have now taken over the project, we would like to be able to do this again. It will soon be time to start planting the seeds and keeping them safe until the weather gets warm enough to get them in the ground. Our allotment is only small, but we would kindly like to ask if anyone is sowing any vegetables, we would be very grateful for any donations of plants in the spring.

#### LITTER

We want to make the school environment a great place for the students that attend here, however there has been a rise in litter around the school and in the corridors. This does affect the school in many ways including the cost

to have it picked up, the habitats around the school, and the nuisance birds. therefore we would like to improve the environment for wildlife. Researchers estimate that over 1m animals die each year after ingesting, or becoming

trapped in, improperly discarded rubbish. This is not something we want to happen around our community, and so we will be designing a new project to hopefully encourage more students to be using the bins around school.

Our reading culture is an important element of our offer as a school, and we are keen to support you when it comes to your child reading at home.

# QUESTIONS TO ASK WHILST READING WITH YOUR CHILD

You could use the prompts below to help you start a discussion about an extract or whole text. You could read the text with your child (either one of you reading or taking it in turns) or you could read the text independently from each other and use these prompts to start a discussion afterwards.

#### Before you read

#### **Predict**

Make predictions before you read something together. This could be based on what will happen next in a story, what an article could be about based on the headline or what clues the book cover can give about the narrative.

- What do you think the cover suggests about the story?
- What do you think will happen next in the story?
- What does the headline suggest the article might be about?
- What do you think you will learn/find out?

#### During or after your reading

## Check understanding regularly

As you read, you will come across words and information they may not fully understand. Make sure you pause and check your child's understanding, thoughts or ideas about something they've read regularly to ensure that they understand what they are reading.

- What do you think... means?
- If neither of us know what it means, how could we find out?
- What do think the writer is suggesting here?
- Which pieces of information do you think are most important and why?
- Is the writer saying ... or ...?
  Why do you think that

### Ask questions to think more deeply

Discuss why the writer has chosen to represent characters, events, settings in a certain way - don't worry if you do not have all the answers! The important thing is to have a discussion with your child and encourage them to think about what they've read more deeply. Praise your child and encourage their discussion, ideas and thinking.

- What are the three most important pieces of information in the text?
- What is the most interesting thing you have learnt and why?
- Which five words are key to the text and why?
- What have you learnt?
- Were your predictions accurate? Why/why not?

has opened her heart at last, and she can't let it go - will she find her friend?





# MOCK EXAM RESULTS

#### Thursday 31 January

Our mock exams are an important stepping stone for Year 11 students as they finish the final year of study. Overall, students and their teachers were really pleased, and its fair to say a number were also very relieved and was clear that where students had put time in to revising and preparing, it showed. This helps confirm that many of our students are already well prepared for their final exams in the summer. However, there are opportunities for everyone to improve over the remaining three months and to help with this, all Year 11 parents and carers are invited to our GCSE Support evening on Tuesday 21 February, from 5.30pm until 7.30pm. #### **CURRICULUM SPOTLIGHT: DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY**

The subject of Design and Technology encourages students to design and manufacture creative, innovative and functional products which solve problems whilst considering their own and other's needs, values and wants.

We encourage students to develop skills and knowledge that will help them not only in their academic studies but throughout their lives, as well as helping them to understand the contribution that design and technology makes to the world around them and the impacts that we as designers and manufacturers contribute to our wider communities.

In Key Stage 3 students rotate around different specialisms throughout the year focussing on working with metals, plastics, timbers, fibres and fabrics, paper and board and electronics as well as studying food preparation and nutrition to learn about healthy lifestyles and diet.

In Key Stage 4 we are currently approaching our busiest time of the year in the Design and Technology department. Following the completion of the mock exams Year 11 Engineering students are completing their final piece

of NEA ready for their final assessment and Design and Technology students are busy planning and preparing to manufacture their final prototypes that they have been designing and working on all year.



In Year 11 Textiles students are just beginning to work on their final externally set assignment which will contribute towards 40% of their GCSE grade and culminates in a 10 hour exam towards the end of their time at school.

In Food Preparation and Nutrition students have been conducting their practical work having to cook and serve a range of dishes which they have developed from a range of context provided by the exam board.

Finally in Key Stage 5
Product Design, Year 12
students are working on
re-developing the iconic
Roberts Radio to develop
their skills using both CAD

and 3D modelling and Year 13 are busy working on their practical outcomes which they have been designing throughout the year. This project will contribute towards 50% of their final A-Level grade and we have projects ranging from vinyl record holders and sheet music stands through to interactive toys for young children to keep them occupied when out with their families.

The department have been lucky to have recently had two 3D printers donated from Reckitt Benckiser which have revolutionised the way students are able to design, develop and prototype as part of their project work. These are being made full use of by our sixth form students as well as our GCSE classes too, producing a range of things from handles and dials for radios through to individually designed components for students projects.
