MESSAGE FROM HEADTEACHER



Welcome to the final edition of The Hunsley Way for this academic year. This half term is always one of my favourites as we reflect and celebrate all that has been achieved throughout the year. In addition to the annual Sports Awards Evening and Duke of Edinburgh Presentation Evening, we have also introduced Celebration Evenings for Years 7, 8, 9 10 and 12, where students are nominated for awards, by staff, for excellence and endeavour. Thank you to all the parents/carers who have attended these events, celebrated with us and encouraged and supported our very worthy recipients. We hope you enjoyed the events as much as we did!



Another highlight this half term has of course been Middleton Hall, where once again we were treated to 170 students enthusiastically showcasing their talents across the creative arts. Thanks to you, the students performed to a packed audience and are already talking about the Christmas showcase. I can't wait!

I am delighted to share the news that we have once again been awarded the Eco Schools Green Flag Award with Distinction. Many thanks to Miss Acaster. the Eco Committee and other volunteers who have supported us in this important area. At a time when all schools are being asked to implement sustainability plans, I am delighted that South Hunsley is already making great strides forward. Another example of this is our participation in the national scheme 'Energy Sparks', which is a charity that supports schools to reduce

their energy consumption and carbon footprint. From 559 schools taking part, South Hunsley has placed third due to us reducing electricity use by 14% which on our current tariff equates to approximately £30k. Furthermore, we have saved almost 20 tonnes of CO².

As we said goodbye to Year 13 students following the close of the exam season, recruitment of Heads students for the next academic year commenced. It was a rigorous process consisting of presentations to staff and students, a group activity and formal interview. Congratulations to Gigi, Erich, Aleena and Syed.

We also said goodbye to Year 11 students (at least for the summer) and enjoyed celebrating with them at Prom. They are a smashing year group who have been superb throughout the exam season and I wish them and all students collecting examination results in August, 'Good luck!' I am confident their hard work and excellent attitude will yield positive outcomes.

The end of a school year can be bittersweet as we also say goodbye to some colleagues. We have thanked them for their commitment and positive contribution to our brilliant school. Similarly, I want to thank Jenny Loncaster and Ann Newlove who have served as school governors for two terms of office and have been incredibly generous with their time, supporting and challenging leaders in school, attending events and representing the school in the community. Alongside the staff moving on, they will be missed.

Lastly, just a reminder that we look forward to school reopening to Year 7 and Year 12 students only on Tuesday 2 September and all other students on Wednesday 3 September.

That's a massive achievement and a significant increase from last year. Many thanks are due to all placement providers and to the individuals who mentor our members and write the essential Assessor reports.





We were very excited to be announced as third place nationally for Energy Sparks. This is used to track our energy consumption, and when we complete projects we gain points. This year the premises team have changed lots of lights to LEDs and in the winter turned the heating down by one degree, this didn't make much difference to us, but did to the consumption.

South Hunsley managed to reduce energy consumption by 14% over the year, at a saving of around £30,000. We hope to continue reducing use next year too.



CURRICULUM

BATTLEFIELDS VISIT

Friday 30 May - Monday 2 June

Year 9 students recently visited key sites on the Western Front to deepen their understanding of the First World War. The group visited the Thiepval Memorial, learning about the thousands of soldiers with no known grave, and explored the Accrington Pals' trenches at the Somme to see the landscape as it was over a century ago. At Tyne Cot Cemetery, the largest Commonwealth war cemetery in the world, students reflected on the scale of sacrifice while learning about the battles fought around Ypres. They also visited the site of the Christmas Truce and Ayette Cemetery where Indian



and Chinese labourers involved in the clean operations after 1918 are buried. A highlight of the visit was Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate, where the daily act of remembrance allowed students to pay their respects and consider the impact of the war on individuals and communities. Josh, Grace, Layla and Zeus represented the school by laying a wreath during the ceremony. Another highlight was when student Naomi C played the Last Post on the trumpet on a section of the front line of the Somme. It was an incredibly moving moment where students were able to reflect on what they had learned on the visit and the legacy of the First World War today. The visit provided a powerful and thoughtful opportunity for students to connect their classroom learning with the reality of history, ensuring the stories of those who served are not forgotten.





WEST END VISIT

Wednesday 4 - Thursday 5 June

45 Year 9 and 10 students headed down to London on our annual West End overnight trip. They spent time in Covent Garden and took in some of the sights, even managing to enjoy a few hours of sunshine!

On Wednesday evening they saw 'The Lion King' at the Lyceum theatre. The set design and puppetry of the animals was amazing! We stayed at a Premier Inn and enjoyed a delicious buffet breakfast on Thursday morning (Mrs Pipes and Mrs Brown get very excited about hash browns) before going to the Tower of London where we saw the Crown Jewels amongst many other interesting parts of our history.

They then went to the Adelphi Theatre to watch a matinee of 'Back to the Future' which was a lot of fun and included some amazing special effects! The students were fantastic and did the school proud, their conduct during our activities was exemplary and we hope everyone had a cracking time.

CURRICULUM

CURRICULUM SPOTLIGHT: RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Religious Studies enables learners to reflect upon and deepen their understanding of human culture, beliefs and thought. It is a quest for understanding the self and the nature of what it means to be human. RS is important as it enables pupils to understand the role that religion plays in everyday life. Whether we believe in a higher power or not, religion influences many aspects of our daily life. It is an opportunity for developing our understanding of the morality of others whilst realising our own.

Our units of work are designed around the Locally Agreed Syllabus, in Tear 7 we consider the main beliefs and practices of Judaism, Christianity and Islam, building upon Key Stage 2 knowledge and preparing pupils for our more thematic approach of Year 8 and 9. We also conduct visits to several local places of worship. In Year 8 we consider issues of prejudice and discrimination, by discussing societal issues such as racism and gender discrimination, considering the greater impact these have on our communities. We then explore various answers given to the philosophical question of 'Is there life after death'. This unit includes various religious beliefs and cultural practices associated with life after death. Including religious and non-religious beliefs and celebrations such as Day of the Dead. Our final topic of Year 8 explores the problem of evil and the challenge to belief in God. Our Year 9 curriculum offers pupils an opportunity to consider questions surrounding the

treatment of criminals, the death penalty, euthanasia/ assisted dying and IVF. Pupils then apply religious beliefs as well, as considering secular views before concluding their own view of these issues. We also challenge our pupils to examine various ethical principles, such as Utilitarianism and Situation Ethics, demonstrating an awareness of the strengths and weakness of these theories. We end Year 9 reflecting on the human and religious impact of the Holocaust and visit the National Holocaust Centre and museum.



At KS4 all pupils cover RS content as part of the CP curriculum, we look at the value of animal life in comparison to human life, the ethical questions these beliefs raise, we study how the media portrays religion, and how this may add to

discrimination or feelings of marginalisation. Our GCSE pupils study Christianity and Buddhism, alongside a range ethical issues including abortion, war, animal rights and gender discrimination to list a few.

At A level, students cover Christianity in greater depth, applying ethical and philosophical content to wider questions of human existence such as the problem of evil, existence of God and the validity of religious experience. We cover a wide range of answers from philosophers, ethicists, scientists and psychologists.

The curriculum allows students to make numerous links between different religions, cultures and traditions, ensuring a knowledge of similarities as well as differences between the main religious traditions. It covers a wide range of ethical and philosophical questions. Preparing your children to be thoughtful, respectful and understanding of the differences of others in their local and global community.




