
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
OVERALL TOTAL HOUSE POINTS (APRIL) HOUSE POINTS








Her competitive spirit has seen her rise to number 17 in the England National Rankings with Table Tennis England in the Under 13s group, despite being two years younger than the majority of her peers which is a fantastic achievement.

Earlier in the year Olivia represented the school in the National School's table tennis tournament in April – finishing in 1st place locally and regionally before finishing in joint 9th place at the nationals.

More recently, she won the 2 star Under 13s Scarborough Ranking tournament, finished in 1st place again in the Under 13s competition in Scunthorpe and even came in 2nd place in the Under 15s group too. With each tournament Olivia gains valuable experience and hones her skills, setting her sights on even greater achievements.



As it stands Olivia currently ranks number 1 in the Under 13s in the whole of Yorkshire and this has opened a wide range of opportunities for her. She had been invited to represent Yorkshire at the Inter Regionals in Wolverhampton, battling against representatives of all regions across the UK. Olivia finished first in her group and gualified for the knockout stages, where she eventually lost in the Quarter Finals. finishing 5th overall in the Under 13s. She was naturally disappointed at losing but overall pleased with her performance.

As well as this, Olivia has been invited to compete at the Mark Bates Nationals, which is the biggest table tennis

In the Easter break Sixth Form students from Driffield School and South Hunsley School travelled to Geneva, Switzerland to visit two institutions prominent in their fields; the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN) and the United Nations (UN).

The students arrived full of excitement and spent the afternoon exploring the city, which sits in the forefront of the picturesque Alps. After an evening of bowling, the students settled back at the hostel.

The following day, the students were toured around the world-famous research facility CERN. They were given access to the data centre, the birthplace of the World Wide Web, and the recently built antimatter factory at the cutting edge of particle physics research. Students were thrilled to meet with renowned researchers and gain insight into the work they undertake at CERN. That evening the students demonstrated how much they had learnt at quiz night – which got very competitive!

On the third day, students explored the History of Science Museum where they were able to browse ancient scientific apparatus which assisted in monumental scientific discoveries. Following this, students embarked on a photograph challenge around Geneva, competing to get snaps with some of the city's highlights.



Finally, the students visited the Palais des Nations, home to the UN. Students were toured around the UN assembly hall and conference rooms, each with design influences from different member states from around the globe. Students were extremely impressed when they were able to observe a meeting of delegates in the Human Rights and Alliance of Civilizations room.



You will have seen in the national media the growing concern about the number of young people who buy and are regularly using e-cigarettes and/or vapes. We recognise that this is a challenge that affects all communities, and a large school like ours is no different. We continue to work hard to educate students about the risks and dangers of



vaping as well as the legality surrounding this.

The school policy is clear, and reflects the legal framework. It is illegal for anyone under 18 to buy a vaping product, or for anyone over 18 to buy a vape for someone who is under 18. For these reasons, vaping is not allowed anywhere on the school side and students are forbidden from having vapes or associated products in school.

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CURRICULUM

HOW TO DEVELOP A LOVE OF READING

Our curriculum is taught to be remembered, not merely encountered.

Our lessons are designed to help students recall their learning and is supported by effective 'retrieval practice'. Students methodically revisit prior learning at appropriate intervals so that it becomes more deeply embedded.

We recognise Literacy as the bedrock of learning. When reading and writing skills are strong, understanding and communication is easier. We look to foster a positive reading culture and work together with online platforms ReadTheory and Good2Learn to nurture the skills taught in school, notably with KS3 students.

Year 7 are set homework tasks on both Good2Learn and ReadTheory, whilst Years 8 and 9 only use ReadTheory (as well as completing knowledge guizzes set on Teams).

What is ReadTheory?

ReadTheory uses adaptive technology to generate exercises that adjust to each student's specific reading level. Students are shown a piece of text and asked guestions about the information they have read.

Good2Learn is an online platform to help learners improve maths and English as taught in school. Each topic is clearly explained in a short video lesson. followed by a series of interactive questions to practice.

What if my child gets stuck?

The interactive exercises and worksheets will automatically get easier or harder depending on your child's performance. Encouraging them to complete the task on their own and in their own time will allow the algorithm to generate the most appropriate level of difficulty.

Does it work?

A study in March 2016 found that 80% of teachers surveyed reported that ReadTheory contributed to an increase in test scores.

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How does it work? Once you are logged in, the Good2Learn dashboard will give access to maths and English lessons, allow vou to view scores, see the lessons completed and rewards. Parents will be able to keep track of their child's progress from the parent's dashboard. Students will have the choice of watching the lesson or taking the exercise. We recommend watching the lesson before tackling the

What is Good2Learn?

"I use ReadTheory and Good2Learn every week. It has helped me to build my confidence with reading and I can understand more from my lessons. I have noticed an improvement in my writing through practicing my skills online."

<< Since launch in 2017, 175 students have enrolled on the Employer Led Programme which enables students to take part in a full employability skills development programme with Inspire Ignite, take part in industry mentoring sessions with local employers and apply for work experience opportunities. The programme has been referenced during a large number of interviews and won the Innovation Award via The Careers & Enterprise Company.



In 2020, Sarah launched the country's first Virtual Pre-Teacher Training Work Experience Programme for school, college and university students who were thinking about joining the profession. The online programme allows people to develop a teaching resource for Kingston Jr Academy in Kenya to support creative teaching and provide resources to local teachers. Since 2020, over 400 enrolments have taken place and the programme now features on the Get Into Teaching website to support recruitment nationally. Sarah has since developed this programme into a faceto-face workshop which tours local schools and colleges and has developed additional enrichment projects for local universities.

Sarah has developed the UK's only Apprenticeship Preparation Programme. The programme enables those looking for an apprenticeship to engage in a structured calendar of events and
