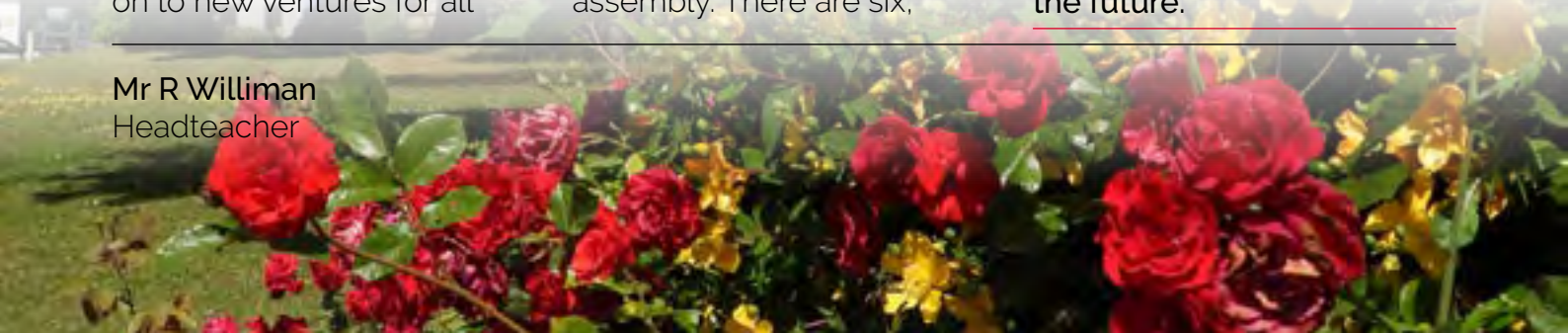
Finally, I thought it might be useful to share with you my reflections on how to achieve success and fulfilment that I talked through with our students in this week's final assembly. There are six,

PRIDE MONTH

June

June plays host to both LGBTQ+ History Month and Pride Month to coincide with the anniversary of the Stonewall riots, a series of protests in 1969 that transformed the gay liberation movement in the USA.

To celebrate Pride, on Friday 30 June, staff were invited to wear bright rainbow colours to represent the LGBTQ+ flag and the Pride themed canteens served rainbow cookies for students to buy. Students also took part in a series of assemblies to learn about the importance of Pride Month and how they can support the gay community.



BATTLEFIELDS - Saturday 10 - Tuesday 13 June

This term a group of 44 Year 9 students travelled to the WWI battlefields in Belgium and France. They visited battle sites such as the Somme and Passchendaele, trenches, memorials and cemeteries commemorating those who died.

The group arrived in Belgium on Saturday and made their way to the Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery, the second largest on the Western Front.

The next day was a day of exploring the trenches and tunnels at Sanctuary Wood, as well as many other sites along the Ypres salient. When they reached Essex Farm, Mr Irwin-Smith led the students in a group reading of famous poem 'In Flanders Field', which was written there in 1915.

One student was able to track down their great-great-uncle's grave at Vlamertinghe cemetery

who died in 1917 aged 72, and another student visited the memorial headstone of her ancestor that died in 1916 at the Battle of the Somme.

After visiting a number of key historical sites, the visit was finished off with Mr Jacobs playing the Last Post on the trumpet at the Somme as the group reflected on the gravity of events that happened there.

PRISON... ME? NO WAY!

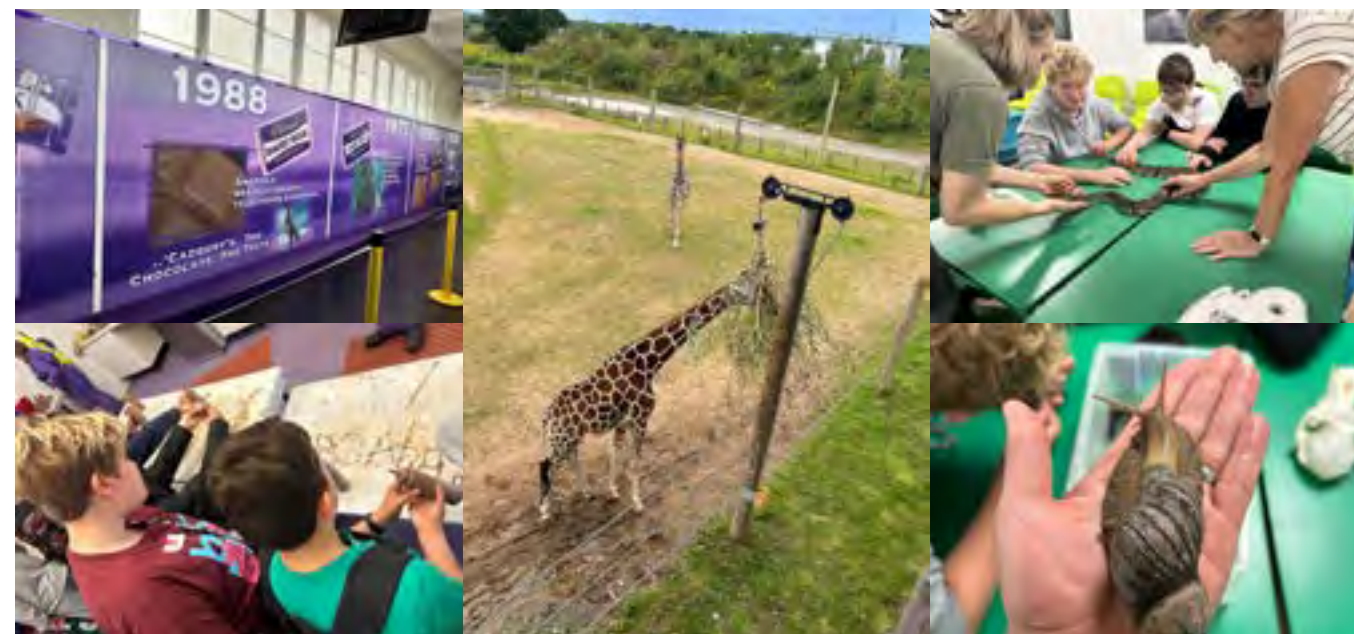
Tuesday 4 July

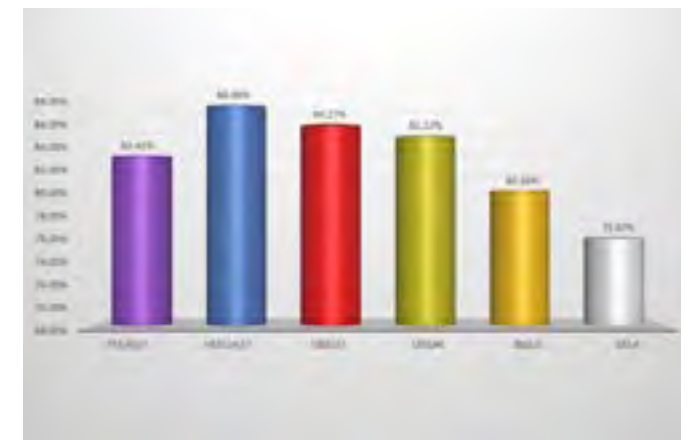


OVERALL TOTAL HOUSE POINTS (FINAL) excluding Sports Day

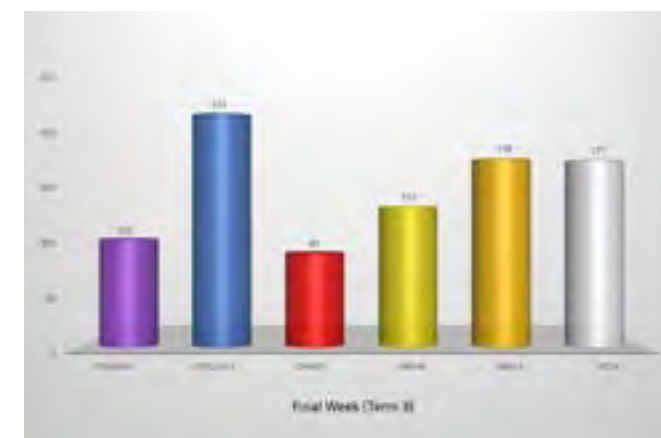
HOUSE POINTS

Wednesday 21 June

We are very proud to learn that Year 11 student Finnley has been offered a scholarship by the aviation and aerospace organisation Air League.

Finn gave us more details on his achievement to tell us about the application process, in the hope that this will encourage any other students who have an ambition to fly to follow their passion.

"I have been awarded a 12-hour powered flying scholarship by the Air League. This is a members only club with an annual payment that allows you to apply for various scholarships and bursaries with no guarantee of success. The company also host many events such as dinners and receptions in which you can 'network' and talk to other like-minded individuals.

The selection process was unlike anything I have been involved in before. It started with an initial application, which included several anecdotes about myself and any previous experience within the aviation industry. After this, a formal interview was conducted. Sadly, I could not accept the invitation to meet the panel in person at British Airways Headquarters due to my GCSE exams, so mine was via Teams.

After this, there was around a three-week waiting period until I was contacted with the news that my application had been successful. The Air League offered 3, 5 and 12-hour awards to the successful scholars and I was given 12 hours. The aim of the 12-hour scholarship is to allow the recipient to go solo by the end of the course. The course will be 10 days and 10 nights, with flying as well as ground school every day. I will be conducting my scholarship at ACS Flight Training based at Perth Airport, Scotland. The Air League also pay for all my food, accommodation and transport to and from the airport during my stay.

It is truly a privilege to be awarded this prestigious scholarship and feels like a huge milestone in my many efforts towards my future ambition to fly."

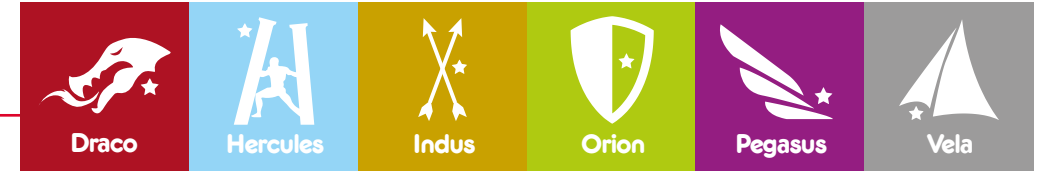

Amongst many other awards, Ava came home with the Reserve Supreme Champion award in the 12 and under category. This means that she has qualified for a further national event later in the year.

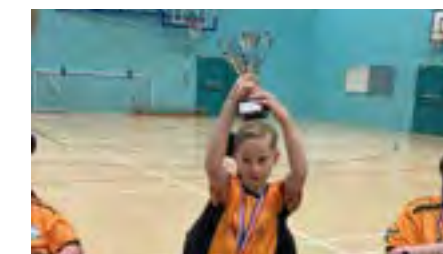

After mingling at the restaurant bar, the students took to their tables for a sit down three-course meal served by the waiting staff.

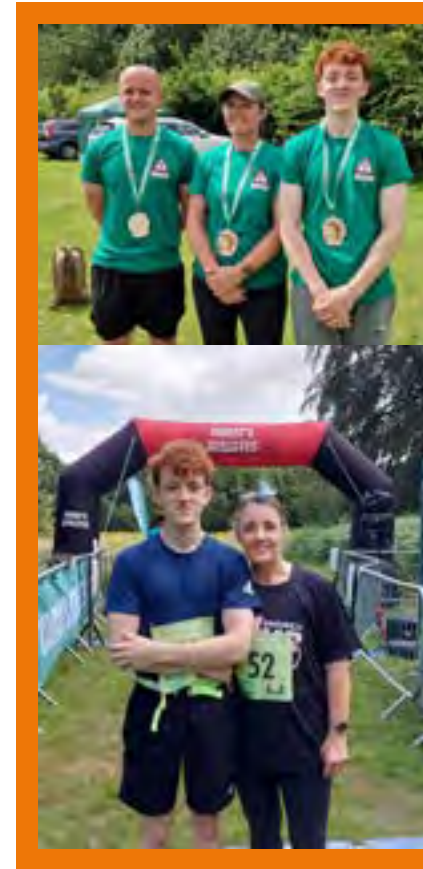
During the course of the night, students and staff were able to explore some of the aquarium exhibits, such as the ice cave, jellyfish

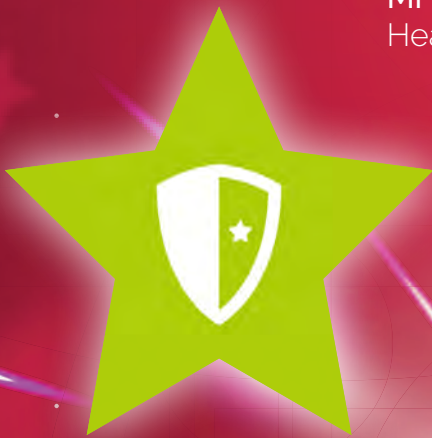

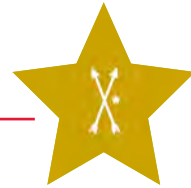

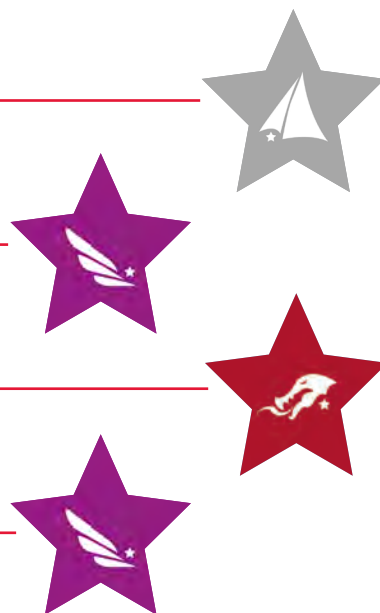
